Did you know that...

The Kudu horn has long been a symbol of Scouting and of Wood Badge. In fact, the Kudu horn was used to rouse the first Scouts at Brownsea Island in 1907. It is used in most Wood Badge courses around the country.

The kudu is a species of antelope that is reddish gray to almost blue in color, found from South Africa to Abyssia. A kudu bull stands almost five feet high at the shoulder. It has magnificent spiral horns capping its head. The Kudu has a remarkable sense of hearing, keen eyesight, sense of smell and great speed, which make it difficult to capture.

As a Colonel in Africa, Baden Powell



commanded a flying column in the Matebele (mat-a-bee'-lee) campaign (1896).

It was on a raid down the Shangani (shang-ann'knee) River that the sound of the kudu horn was first identified.

The men were puzzled by the way the alarm was spread with such rapidity among the Matabeles, until it was discovered that they were using a war horn with tremendous carrying power. A code existed so that as soon as the enemy was sighted, the alarm would be sounded.

It is strange eleven years later, in 1907, this Matabele war horn would be used to summon Scouts at Brownsea Island.

During the early years of Scouting, the Kudu horn was silent. It resurfaced in 1920, where it was used in training courses.

The original Kudu horn is found at Gilwell. The Horn that heralded the birth of scouting now summons Scouters from all parts of the world to do better than they have every done before.

Role and Responsibilities of the Patrol Leader

- Take a leading role in planning and conducting patrol meetings and activities.

- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Law.
- Practice using the leadership and team, the skills being presented during Wood Badge presentations.

- Ensure that daily patrol self-assessments are carried out in a timely, effective manner.
- Provide patrol members with all the resources and information they need to succeed.
- Empower the patrol to become a high-performance team.
- See that the patrol is prepared for all course presentations and activities.

Role and Responsibilities of the Assistant Patrol Leader

- Assume the responsibilities of the patrol leader whenever the patrol leader is unable to do so.
- Encourage patrol members to fully participate in the Wood Badge course and to achieve all they can.

- Assist the patrol leader in empowering the patrol to become a high-performance team.
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Law.

Role and Responsibilities of the Patrol Chaplains' Aide

In concert with the chaplain aides of the other patrols and with the assistant Scoutmaster assigned to coordinate their efforts, the patrol chaplain aide will:

- Learn what resources are available that can be used for religious observances during the course and make that information available to the rest of the patrol.
- Develop and help present the participants' Scout's Own religious service.

- Assist in conducting any other religious observances that may arise during the Wood Badge course.
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Law.

Role and Responsibilities of the Patrol Scribe

- Provide interesting and timely material about the patrol to the publisher of The Gilwell Gazette – the daily newspaper of the course.

- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Law.

Role and Responsibilities of the Patrol Member

For a patrol to succeed as a team, each of its members must:

- Fully participate in the Wood Badge course and achieve all he or she can.
- Help his or her patrol meet its obligations to fulfill assignments including the development and presentation of the patrol project.

- Practice using the team development skills introduced during Wood Badge presentations.
- Set a good example by living up to the Scout Oath and Law.
- Have fun!

Service Patrol

- Be responsible for the general cleanliness of the Wood Badge course meeting areas.
- Assist in Theater room set-up.

- Empty garbage & waste containers at end of day
- Assist the quartermaster with the evening cracker barrels.

Program Patrol

- Conduct the morning flag-raising ceremony.
- As part of the flag-raising ceremony, present a brief history of a historic flag and lead the group in a song associated with that flag.
- Lower the flags in the evening.

- Ensure that all staff and participants are appropriately notified of the starting and ending of all training sessions.
- Provide leadership for Day Four participant campfire
