California Flag



California's official flag, the Bear Flag, has hardly changed at all from what it looked like when it was first raised by American settlers during an uprising against Mexico in 1846. The uprising, led by John C. Fremont and a small band of California settlers, was called the Bear Flag Revolt. They declared the state to be the California Republic and began a war of independence from Mexico. The republic lasted less than a month, June 14 to July 11 when troops from the United States arrived to take over the war. The war ended on February 2nd, 1848 when the U.S. and Mexico signed off the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo. Although the California Republic was short-lived, its flag has become the official flag of California. It is a living symbol of our history and tradition.



Important Information for your closing day at Camp Lindblad

From the Quartermaster...

The Patrol Boxes need to be prepared for storage and taken to the Storage Container above Gilwell Field.

1. All pots, pans, plates, etc need to be cleaned and stowed in the box with the legs of the patrol box.
2. The stoves are to be cleaned with soap and water and stowed in the box WITH the gas supply hose.
3. The lantern and tree pole are NOT stored in the box, but taken to the Storage Container separately.
4. The Campsite sign needs to be taken down and taken to the Storage Container.
5. All food is to be removed from the Patrol Box.
6. All trash bags and recycling bags are to be taken to the area behind the lodge.
7. Please be sure to police your campsites. "A Scout leaves it cleaner than he found it".
